Learning Outcomes:

In this course, students will

- 1. participate actively in digital literacy the ability to communicate with an evolving community to discuss issues, gather information, and seek assistance from others
- 2. engage in global literacy the capacity to read, interpret, respond, and contextualize digital content from a global perspective
- 3. demonstrate technology literacy the ability to use computers and other technologies to improve learning and performance

Goals

In this course, students will

- 1. use Internet Search Tools (e.g., Yahoo Images, Google Images, Ask Pictures, and Picsearch) and Public Domain Websites (e.g., The NYPL Picture Collection Online, Digital History, Picture History) to gather images for the digital stories.
- 2. use Macromedia Flash, Adobe Premiere, Photostory, Movie Maker, Apple iMovie, Adobe Photoshop Elements, Gold Wave, SnagIt, and other multimedia software to create digital stories
- 3. create narratives that are personal, informative, or instructive
- 4. organize their ideas, express opinions, and construct meaningful narratives
- 5. develop creative, independent, and inventive thinking
- 6. increase their computer skills through a variety of multimedia assignments
- 7. utilize cutting-edge, productivity tools to create high quality media products

Objectives:

To fulfill the goals, students will

- 1. employ a variety of media to communicate information and ideas effectively to multiple audiences
- 2. use spoken, written, and visual language to accomplish their own purposes (e.g., for learning, enjoyment, persuasion, and the exchange of information)

- 3. publish their digital work on the Internet for viewing and critiquing of instructors and classmates
- 4. develop the ability to compose digital images in a sequence to convey meaning
- 5. participate as knowledgeable, reflective, creative and critical members of a variety of literacy communities
- 6. understand the media production process, including copyright and fair use in education
